2008 '65 "Guys Only Golf Outing" for Bend, Oregon, Sep 6-11

From **Bob Blake** – "Continuing the format begun in Scottsdale, April 07, '65's next "GOGO" (Guys Only Golf Outing) will be September 6-11 in the picturesque high desert area of Bend, Oregon.

Ron Knapp, who will be our host, reports that "golfing around the Bend environs has been and is great in early Fall... which isn't to say we can't get the odd chilly-windy day in September, thanks to an early wayward weather front." Normal temps in September are 72/39, though 2007 brought unseasonal heat! Ron also praises the number and variety of golf options locally—cut through beautiful Ponderosa Pine forests, bordering on lakes/ivers, with the spectacular Cascade mountains in the background! How's your concentration?

The plan is to arrive Sep 6, and play 4-5 courses over as many days, depending on group interest. Ron's private home course, Awbrey Glen, will be included with members joining in, along with several of the best of the other 24 area courses, such as: Lost Tracks, Aspen Lakes, Widgi Creek, Eagle Crest, Juniper (in Redmond), and Sunriver Meadows or Woodlands. Review the descriptions (<http://www.oregongolf.com/cent/>), and let Ron know if there are courses you especially like the looks of. Costs for golf range from \$70—\$90 per round, including carts.

The Phoenix Inn Suites (<http://www.phoenixinn.com/bend/>), on the edge of downtown Bend, will be our home away from home, holding a block of king bedded suites until August 4. The rate is \$129 plus 10% tax, including their extended breakfast buffet! See the Inn's amenities on the web, and note the range of local activities, including exploring historic downtown Bend, with its excellent restaurant options, local brewpubs, or sightseeing. Make your reservations directly with the hotel at: 1-888-291-4764. Ask for the Dartmouth 65 Golf Group Block.

Fly via Portland or Seattle into the Bend/Redmond Airport (RDM), where rental cars are available. Or take the scenic drive over from Portland (about 175 miles/4 hours).

To relax after playing, or for a day off from golf, options include canoeing or rafting on the Deschutes River or the numerous Cascade Mountain lakes, mountain biking, all class of hikes, world-class fly-fishing, or catching a spectacular view of the Northwest from the top of Mt. Bachelor! Bend is a destination recreation area so there are plenty of opportunities to get out and about. Another Bend classmate, **Al Stewart**, a golfer and avid fly fisherman, has offered to organize on-water activity—fish for dinner, anyone?

Cost will be courses played plus accommodations, with group meals/drinks split. Contact Ron directly, as soon as possible, to indicate your interest or with questions, to give him a sense of numbers: rknapp@bendbroadband.com; or: 541-330-0965.

Cindy,

Peter was one of my closest friends at Dartmouth and roommate sophomore year. Peter was a highly decorated combat officer in Viet Nam and served multiple terms. His bravery was duly noted in a 3 page letter written to his mother by General Norman Schwartzkof when the general learned of Peter's death. In the letter which Peter's mother sent to me, he said that Peter was the bravest officer he had ever commanded in battle. After Viet Nam, Peter continued to serve the army in Germany. One night driving back to the barracks late, he hit a bridge on the autobahn at high speed. He was badly injured and nearly died. He lost most of his cognitive ability and memory. Peter barely remembered me, and essentially was left with the mind of a young boy. Worked as a page at the Kennedy Center. Even though he suffered from all this, my wife and I brought him with us to, I believe, our 25th reunion at Dartmouth. Most classmates did not notice his malady because he covered as much as he could with his incredible charm. He was a big hit. It was an experience I will never forget.

Several years ago, perhaps five now, I received a phone call from Peter's brother, Gratian, who told me that Peter had died. He was living in Washington D.C accompanied by a male nurse provide by the army who was with him most of the time. They were barbecuing on the terrace when the nurse left momentarily to go to the bathroom. When the nurse returned, Peter was dead. He had tasted a piece of steak, which got stuck in his throat. Incredible. This brave and beautiful man, who faced death so many times in Viet Nam, and fought through a horrible car crash, passed away by choking on a piece of meat. He lives in peace in Cornish, New Hampshire in a family plot. I will visit him again this summer to stop by and quietly share our memories. I loved him as a brother, miss him deeply, and think of him all the time.

1. Minutes of the last Class Meeting on October 21, 2007 were distributed and approved.

2. President's Remarks - **Ken McGruther**

- Ken thanked the organizing committee (**Bob Blake, Rich Bloch, Don Boardman, Ted Bracken, Mark Efron, Pete Frederick, Bob McConaughy**) for pulling off a terrific 65th Birthday gathering. Also, thanks to **Mark Sisitsky '67** and Ann Donovan of the Jones Day Law Firm for their assistance in the reception and dinner held in the Firm's office.
 - Ted Bracken will provide Mark and Ann with suitable "thank you gifts" to be charged to the Class Treasury as part of the Executive Committee approval of underwriting the event
- Website: Thanks were expressed for John Sottile's fine work as webmeister
- Newsletter: Ken expressed thanks on behalf of the Class to Carl Boe who has produced 3-4 issues annually. Efforts continue to get more e-mail addresses for electronic distribution. Carl will get out another Newsletter within a month to hype the GO-GO Weekend in Sept and Homecoming Mini in October.
- DAM Class Column: Ken expressed thanks on behalf of the Class to Roger Hansen for writing the column and continuing to do so in fine fashion.
- Alumni fund report from Jim Griffiths - on "glide slope as we approach end of this year's giving campaign; 41% of classmates have contributed to date and over \$300K given. Campaign workers were urged to make final contacts before the June 30 deadline. Jim is readying a last-month push.

From **Jennifer Casey**, a note to **David Spaulding**, VP for Alumni Relations: “We have some inspiring news for you. Yesterday morning, three Dartmouth seniors who led their class’s fundraising drive shared with President Wright that 92.5 percent of the Class of 2008 contributed to their Senior Class Gift, for a total of \$15,978. Fifteen coed, fraternity, and sorority organizations reached 100 percent participation. The class was encouraged in its efforts by a challenge from a group of alumni who are members of Dartmouth’s Wall Street Forum in New York. This is a remarkable achievement, and both a reflection of their feelings for Dartmouth and a valuable introduction to the role of philanthropy in the life of the College. Said a student, “I, for one, wouldn’t be here if it weren’t for the scholarships that Dartmouth gave. So I’d like to do my part to help out a future Dartmouth student.” Many talked similarly of a responsibility to help those who will follow them on the Green.
